The first branch of Rastafari is believed to have been established in Jamaica in 1935 by Leonard P. Howell.

- Rastafarians believe that they are being tested by Jah (God) through slavery and the existence of economic injustice and racial "downpression" (rather than oppression).
- They await their deliverance from captivity and their return to Zion, the symbolic name for Africa drawn from the biblical tradition.

Rastafarianism is a very new religion. It began in 1930 in Jamaica. Marcus Garvey, a Jamaican, predicted there would be a black messiah in Africa. As it turned out Ras Tafari, a prince, became Emperor of Ethiopia in 1930. As emperor he was called Haile Selassie but the name Rastafarianism comes from his name, Ras Tafari. People believed he was the black messiah Marcus Garvey was talking about.

- The emperor, who Rastafarians believe was a descendant of ancient Israel's King Solomon, soon came to be worshipped by some Jamaicans and other blacks as a divine being.

- Universal Negro Improvement Association (UNIA), founded by Marcus Garvey, dedicated to racial pride, economic self-sufficiency, and the formation of an independent Black nation in Africa.
