Nathaniel Mary Quinn

Nathaniel Mary Quinn (b. 1977) creates hybrid, fractured portraits on paper and linen using charcoal, gouache, pastel, paint stick, and oil paint. His works are replete with art historical references to Cubism, Surrealism, Francis Bacon, and others, yet his process is also very personal, drawing from his memories, experiences, traumas, and family history growing up in Chicago's Robert Taylor housing project.

Wangechi Mutu

thin worlds, populated by powerful hybridised female figures. Her practice has been described as engaging in her own unique form of myth-making, one in which the interweaving of fact with fiction opens up possibilities for another group of symbolic female characterisations, markedly different from those that appear in either classical history or popular culture.

Chiharu Shiota

Japanese artist Chiharu Shiota is best known for her performances and large-scale thread installations which often incorporate common objects and or memorabilia. Shiota also works with sculpture, photography, video, and drawing.

Faith Ringgold

As an artist, activist and children's author Ringgold (b. 1930, Harlem, New York) has challenged perceptions of African American identity and gender inequality for over five decades. Growing up in the creative and intellectual context of the Harlem Renaissance and inspired by her contemporaries including writers James Baldwin and Amiri Baraka, she is widely recognised for her painted story quilts combining personal narratives, history and politics "to tell my story, or, more to the point, my side of the story", as an African American woman.
