We use the VESPA growth mindset model to help our students develop the characteristics that enable them to become successful. We know they work as our students have helped model and develop many activities - please take time to read what VESPA means.

VESPA expectations

Vision: We want you to have a clear goal that you want to achieve. The actions you take have



clear objectives in mind, by breaking down challenges into smaller components you can help to maintain your motivation. You stick to your vision despite obstacles that are thrown up in your path. This characteristic is known as "grit" (Duckworth et al. 2007).

Effort - It is widely understood that those performers who are willing to put in great amounts of time and effort are consistently more successful. Effort is a key factor in success. At the Norwood School, effort is measured by the use of independent learning, the more you do that is effective the better your outcome.

Systems - Strategies that are used to help students make sense of over 130 hours of teaching that goes on each year for just one subject. Good systems help students to complete tasks in order to meet deadlines. We focus on managing projects which helps to avoid anxiety and stress.

Practice - "Academic progress is as much about how you work as it is about how long you work for." (Oakes & Griffin, 2016) Learning & mastery in Key Stage 5 is about;

- a) Content mastering content taught by reviewing & consolidating it, checking it and ensuring understanding
- b) Skills Put the knowledge into practice in a high stakes environment, practising exam questions, timing themselves, trying challenging questions & mock exams.
- c) Feedback Seeking expert feedback that allows them to develop performance.

Attitude - is a <u>settled</u> way of thinking, over time that helps learners form an approach that allows them to demonstrate perseverance, buoyancy & positivity, respond to challenge and adversity and finally show their "grit".

Flipped learning

Flipped learning is the pre-lesson preparation, reflection and questioning that pupils undertake to help inform a teacher's planning.

(Mazur, 1997)

How does it work?

Prior to a lesson a teacher could direct you towards specific resources (often online media)

that you need to digest and respond to.

What would your teachers ask you to do?

•They may tell you what topics are coming up in the next week and you can do some pre

lesson work.

•They could ask you to read around an issue and then use the thinking hard templates to

transform your learning.

They may give you videos to watch and to make notes from!

Why is this useful to you?

You then attend the lesson with a great deal of knowledge & questions ready to further your

understanding.

How flipped learning can help you

•You are in control of your learning and performance.

•It improves your questioning skills.

•You become independent with your learning.

•You can support each other to learn.

•Technology can enhance your learning experience.

You have more time to discuss complex concepts during lesson time.

You are able to apply your learning through problem solving & participation in

collaborative tasks.

During your A Level studies you will be exploring new time periods, topics and themes in both breadth and depth. Understanding the key chronology of your units will be central to your ability to both analyse sources in their context and engage critically and meaningfully with essay questions.

Step 1: Identify which two examination units you will be completing as part of Y12 History. For you this will be

The USA: Searching for the American Dream 1917-96

From Apartheid State to Rainbow Nation 1948-94

Step 2: Create a timeline on A3 paper which spans the entire time period you will be studying for each of your Y12 topics.

Step 3: On your timeline, plot on the key events with full dates and titles.

Step 4: For each event, can you write a brief description of what happened and the consequences of it?

<u>Step 5:</u> In a separate colour, draw and annotate arrows explaining the connections between the events in your timeline – how are key events/changes connected?

<u>Step 6:</u> Counterfactual analysis is a key component of A Level study. For 5 of the events on your timeline, can you explain how history would have been different if this event had not occurred? Can you predict how your timeline might have looked different? What does this tell you about the importance of this event within this unit of work?

<u>Challenge:</u> Can you now begin to explain the strengths and limitations of timelines? How far, and in what ways, will they be useful to you in studying the past?


